	SPECIES	SCIENTIFIC NAME	COMMENTS
1	Great Crested Grebe	<i>Podiceps cristatus</i>	Seen on 4 days with excellent views of several starting to perform their courtship display o muddy fish ponds
2	Black-necked Grebe	<i>Podiceps nigricollis</i>	Seen on 3 days with an adult and chicks seen on Churchill lakes.
3	Great Cormorant	<i>Phalacrocorax carbo</i>	Up to 12 seen on 2 days at Churchill lakes. Note these birds were the subspecies <i>sinensis</i> which nest in trees on lakes in Easten Europe.
4	Pygmy Cormorant	<i>Phalacrocorax pygmeus</i>	Lots seen on Churchill lakes sat in trees and flying around and several seen closer at mud pond 2 where we had very nice views
5	Great Bittern	<i>Botaurus stellaris</i>	Heard only on 2 days, with 2 birds each time and loud booming heard on marsh near canal.
6	Little Bittern	<i>Ixobrychus minutus</i>	Single birds seen on 3 days with female showing well in reedy ditch on our way to the lodge and mazingly 3 birds seen on a rainy day.
7	Black-crowned Night Heron	<i>Nycticorax nycticorax</i>	Seen on 4 days with several flying around fish ponds during the day and others out feeding in the open. Maximum count of 6 in one day
8	Squacco Heron	<i>Ardeola ralloides</i>	Seen on 2 days with 2 flying over lakes at Churchill and 4 sheen well at mud ponds 1 & 2
9	Little Egret	<i>Egretta garzetta</i>	Seen in small numbers every day around ponds or wetlands
10	Great Egret	<i>Egretta alba</i>	Seen everyday around ponds and wetlands with maximum count of around 25 together
11	Grey Heron	<i>Ardea cinerea</i>	Seen on 6 days mostly flying over. Maximum of 30 in one day at Churchill lakes and fish ponds
12	Purple Heron	<i>Ardea purpurea</i>	This often skulky species was seen on 6 days with most in flight but others showing well in wetlands. A maximum of 8 on day 2 was good
13	Black Stork	<i>Ciconia nigra</i>	A scarce bird we saw individuals on 2 days with superb views of one as it flew toward and over us a wetland reserve and another at fish ponds
14	White Stork	<i>Ciconia ciconia</i>	This widespread bird was seen every day and included many close views plus several posing for photographs on nest and even one on a wire!
15	Spoonbill	<i>Platalea leucorodia</i>	Seen on 5 days we had lots of good views with singles and pairs in full breeding plumage flying overhead. Maximum of 10 around fish ponds
16	Mute Swan	<i>Cygnus olor</i>	A few birds seen on 4 days around wetlands
17	Greylag Goose	<i>Anser anser</i>	Small groups and scattered pairs seen near wetlands and fields on 6 days
18	Shelduck	<i>Tadorna tadorna</i>	Just 2 seen by a few of us by tower on wetland reserve
19	Mallard	<i>Anas platyrhynchos</i>	Widespread and small numbers seen every day
20	Gadwall	<i>Anas strepera</i>	The odd pair seen on 4 days on ponds and pools
21	Shoveler	<i>Anas clypeata</i>	3 seen at Churchill lakes on one day
22	Common Teal	<i>Anas Crecca</i>	Five birds seen distantly on just one day
23	Garganey	<i>Anas querquedula</i>	Seen on 3 days with 3 on roadside pools on 2 days and others in wetlands on one other day
24	Pochard	<i>Aythya ferina</i>	Fairly common and seen on ponds on 5 days

			with maximum of 60 in one day
25	Red-crested Pochard	<i>Netta rufina</i>	An unexpected find as scarce in this part of Hungary we had one male bird fly out marsh
26	Ferruginous Duck	<i>Aythya nyroca</i>	Seen on 4 days with good views at several areas including Churchill lakes. Max of 8 in one day
27	White-tailed Eagle	<i>Haliaeetus albicilla</i>	2 sub adult birds seen flying low over forest at Churchill lakes
28	Western Marsh Harrier	<i>Circus aeruginosus</i>	Widespread and common and seen every day
29	Montagu's Harrier	<i>Circus pygargus</i>	Seen on a 2 days with best views of 3 together over fields on one day. 2 males and a female
30	Eurasian Sparrowhawk	<i>Accipiter nisus</i>	3 birds seen on 2 days with one notable bird seen circling amongst a flock of bee-eaters
31	Common Buzzard	<i>Buteo buteo</i>	Widespread and common we saw several on each and every day of the trip
32	Common Kestrel	<i>Falco tinnunculus</i>	Seen on every day of the trip
33	Red-footed Falcon	<i>Falco vespertinus</i>	Seen on 4 days we had superb views of small groups with a max of 10 on one day, Males and females seen hunting and perched. Fantastic!
34	Hobby	<i>Falco subbuteo</i>	One seen well flying over mud pond 1
35	Saker Falcon	<i>Falco cherrug</i>	An excellent species we had a female flying low and landing on electric pylons where one held a nest that had 4 chicks which occasionally showed
36	Grey Partridge	<i>Perdix perdix</i>	A good spot by Julie of a pair beside the road that never ran off and allowed superb views
37	Quail	<i>Coturnix coturnix</i>	Heard calling their distinctive song on 4 days
38	Common Pheasant	<i>Phasianus colchicus</i>	Seen in small numbers every day of the trip
39	Water Rail	<i>Rallus aquaticus</i>	Heard only briefly on one day at mud pond 1
40	Common Moorhen	<i>Gallinula chloropus</i>	Seen on 4 days with max of 2 on or near ponds
41	Eurasian Coot	<i>Fulica atra</i>	Max of 3 seen on ponds on 4 days of trip
42	Great Bustard	<i>Otis tarda</i>	Up to 9 birds were seen in grassy fields as we drove towards lodge. Walking the hillside in the open and 2 seen in flight were impressive. Another 6 were seen at another site but distant
43	Black-winged Stilt	<i>Himantopus himantopus</i>	Up to 5 seen on 3 days of the trip. Several at wetlands including a few birds on nests
44	Avocet (Pied)	<i>Recurvirostra avosetta</i>	Good views of up to 8 on 4 days in wetlands
45	Stone-curlew	<i>Burhinus oedicnemus</i>	Seen on 3 days we had distant views at a gravel workings but superb views at a roadside pool
46	Collared Pratincole	<i>Glareola pratincola</i>	5 birds were scoped in arable fields where they were seen perched, flying and even copulating!
47	Little Ringed Plover	<i>Charadrius dubius</i>	Up to 4 were seen distantly at gravel workings
48	Northern Lapwing	<i>Vanellus vanellus</i>	Widespread and common and a distinctive sight and sound of the lowlands. Fantastic calls!
49	Ruff	<i>Philomachus pugnax</i>	Up to 60 flew into pool on first day and included several males in full dress of black and chestnut, a few others seen at fish pond
50	Dunlin	<i>Calidris alpina</i>	Just 2 seen in full summer plumage in roadside pool on first day as we travelled toward lodge
51	Little Stint	<i>Calidris minuta</i>	1 was scoped amongst ruff in roadside pool as we travelled toward lodge on the first day
52	Wood Sandpiper	<i>Tringa glareola</i>	Seen on 2 days we had up to 30 on a roadside pool as we drove toward lodge on the first day
53	Spotted Redshank	<i>Tringa erythropus</i>	Seen on 3 days the best views were 2 almost in full breeding plumage seen on a roadside pool on the first day as we drove toward lodge

54	Common Redshank	<i>Tringa totanus</i>	Seen on 5 days with most birds noisy and and showing well either feeding or in display flights
55	Black-tailed Godwit	<i>Limosa limosa</i>	A single bird on first day was in in full breeding colours, and another was seen at a nesting area
56	Black-headed Gull	<i>Larus ridibundus</i>	Common and widespread we saw many on every day of trip with a max of 80 on one day
57	Mediterranean Gull	<i>Larus melanocephalus</i>	Distant views on 2 days with scope views of adults including up to 4 at gravel workings
58	Yellow-legged Gull	<i>Larus cachinnans</i>	Small numbers seen on 4 days
59	Common Tern		Seen on 4 days with up to 10 flying over ponds
60	Whiskered Tern	<i>Chlidonias hybridus</i>	The commonest marsh tern seen on 5 days with up to 25 together over wetlands and ponds
61	White-winged Tern	<i>Chlidonias leucopterus</i>	A very smart tern in its breeding cplumage we saw maximum of 8 on 3 days over wetlands
62	Black Tern	<i>Chlidonias niger</i>	Maximum of 3 seen together over wetlands and recorded on 3 seperate days
63	Feral Pigeon	<i>Colomba livia</i>	A common sight and seen on most days
64	Wood Pigeon	<i>Columba palumbus</i>	Wdespread and common and seen every day
65	Eurasian Collared Dove	<i>Streptopelia decaocto</i>	Common around villages and seen every day
66	European Turtle Dove	<i>Streptopelia turtur</i>	Seen on 5 days we only had a few brief sightings apart from one scoped on tree top
67	Common Cuckoo	<i>Cuculus canorus</i>	Surprisingly common with several sightings every day. Good views of many, plus many more heard and one Rufous bird seen.
68	Tawny Owl	<i>Strix aluco</i>	We had excellent views of one on a short night walk from lodge. Others were heard calling
69	Little Owl	<i>Athene noctua</i>	A really good find by Gina on day 2 of a bird sat on an electricity pylon
70	(European) Nightjar	<i>Caprimulgus europaeus</i>	WE had spotlight views of one perched and flying on a short night walk from the lodge
71	Common Swift	<i>Apus apus</i>	Only one or two on day 1 then up to 20 in the rain on our second to last day
72	Common Kingfisher	<i>Alcedo atthis</i>	One seen well by just a few of us on fish ponds and probably the same bird very distant by all
73	European Bee-Eater	<i>Merops apiaster</i>	Recorded on 6 days we heard plenty flying over, but the best was near the lodge where we had fabulous views of birds perched and hawking!
74	European Roller	<i>Coracias garrulus</i>	Seen on 6 days these stunning birds were nearly always on wires, in ones and pairs
75	Eurasian Hoopoe	<i>Upupa epops</i>	We saw on 2 day and heard other! Frank was particularly happy with our first sighting of a bird that flew right past us over open meadows
76	Eurasian Wryneck	<i>Jynx torquilla</i>	This species was very much wanted and eventually we got fantastic views of one bird singing from a dead tree top
77	Green Woodpecker	<i>Picus viridis</i>	Seen on 3 days, bar a couple of fly past we got very good views of 2 different birds perched
78	Black Woodpecker	<i>Dryocopus martius</i>	One bird called in gave stunning views perched on a dead tree. This was a highlight for all. Another attending a nest was seen by gabor
79	Great Spotted Woodpecker	<i>Dendrocopos major</i>	One or two birds were seen on every day of the trip
80	Syrian Woodpecker	<i>Dendrocopos syriacus</i>	One gave good but brief views to most of group before disappearing and not relocated
81	Middle Spotted Woodpecker	<i>Dendrocopos medius</i>	One got away from all but alan, then a pair showed well, and finally another showed very well near our singing wryneck

82	White-backed Woodpecker	<i>Dendrocopus leuotos</i>	Poor views of a bird that disappeared and showed again very briefly in the Bukk hills may have been this species
83	Crested Lark	<i>Galerida cristata</i>	Suprisingly few seen with ones or twos on 5 days of the trip
84	Eurasian Skylark	<i>Alauda arvensis</i>	Seen mostly in song flight on 6 days it became a familiar part of the Hungarian countryside
85	Sand Martin	<i>Riparia riparia</i>	Ones or twos seen on 4 days, a small colony seen well and over a 100 hunting on a rainy day
86	Barn Swallow	<i>Hirundo rustica</i>	Widespread and common seen every day
87	House Martin	<i>Delichon urbica</i>	A few seen around villages on 5 days
88	Tawny Pipit	<i>Anthus campestris</i>	3 birds were seen on 3 seperate days
89	Tree Pipit	<i>Anthus trivialis</i>	Excellent views of just one bird perched showing all id features prior to a thunderstorm
90	Yellow Wagtail	<i>Motacilla flava flava</i>	Good numbers seen on 6 days. The birds were of the Central European subspecies <i>flava</i>
91	Grey Wagtail	<i>Motacilla cinerea</i>	One bird seen near stream in the Bukk hills
92	White Wagtail	<i>Motacilla alba</i>	Common and seen in small numbers every day
93	Wren	<i>Troglodytes troglodytes</i>	Heard a couple of times and seen close to lodge
94	European Robin	<i>Erithacus rubecula</i>	Just a couple of skulking birds seen on 2 days
95	Common Nightingale	<i>Luscinia megarhynchos</i>	Recorded on 6 days, mostly singing we did get varying views of at least 3 birds
96	Black Redstart	<i>Phoenicurus ochruros</i>	Seen around the lodge and other settlements on 6 days
97	Common Redstart	<i>Phoenicurus phoenicurus</i>	One pair proved elusive in the lodge gardens
98	Whinchat	<i>Saxicola rubetra</i>	Only 2 seen with best views of 1 at Bustard site
99	Common Stonechat	<i>Saxicola torquata</i>	Widespread and easily seen every day of the trip
100	Northern Wheatear	<i>Oenanthe oenanthe</i>	Up to 4 seen on 1 day in arable fields
101	Eurasian Blackbird	<i>Turdus merula</i>	Widespread and seen in small numbers each day
102	Song Thrush	<i>Turdus philomelos</i>	Seen on 5 days with maxium of 4 on one day
103	Mistle Thrush	<i>Turdus viscivorus</i>	A tricky bird was seen on and off at the lodge over 5 days, eventually giving good views to all
104	River Warbler	<i>Locustella fluviatilis</i>	Heard once by the corncrake fields, and one bird was seen well singing in mosquito forest
105	Savi's Warbler	<i>Locustella luscinioides</i>	Two separate birds gave brief but stunning close views in reeds at mud pond 1
106	Sedge Warbler	<i>Acrocephalus schoenobaenus</i>	Several seen very well on 5 days around wetlands, reedbeds and edge of fish ponds
107	Eurasian Reed Warbler	<i>Acrocephalus scirpaceus</i>	Seen on 3 days some bird were out in the open and singing from reeds at edge of fish ponds
108	Great Reed Warbler	<i>Acrocephalus arundinaceus</i>	One of our commonest warblers seen well and heard a lot on 6 days anywhere near reeds
109	Icterine Warbler	<i>Hippolais icterina</i>	2 were seen and heard singing in the woods beside the corncrake fields
110	Barred Warbler	<i>Sylvia nisoria</i>	1 bird singing near our lodge on early morning walk and then another two also singing near mud pond 2 and the corncrake fields
111	Lesser Whitethroat	<i>Sylvia curruca</i>	Just one seen by a few in morning by the lodge
112	Common Whitethroat	<i>Sylvia communis</i>	1 seen singing from dead bush by fish ponds
113	Blackcap	<i>Sylvia atricapilla</i>	Widespread and heard on 6 days with a few sightings at a variety of habitats
114	Garden Warbler	<i>Sylvia borin</i>	Heard in mosquito forest on our first day
115	Wood Warbler	<i>Phylloscopus sibilatrix</i>	1 bird seen pretty well by half the group and

			heard singing in woodlands on 3 other days
116	Common Chiffchaff	<i>Phylloscopus collybita</i>	Seen and heard at several sites on 6 days
117	Spotted Flycatcher	<i>Muscicapa striata</i>	Small numbers at a variety of sites on 6 days
118	Collared Flycatcher	<i>Ficedula albicollis</i>	Excellent views of a bird nesting on day one in mosquito wood and then 2 more on our last day in the Bukk hills
119	Long-tailed Tit	<i>Aegithalos caudatus europaeus</i>	Good views of family parties on 2 days. These birds were the Central European race <i>europaeus</i>
120	Blue Tit	<i>Parus caeruleus</i>	Only a few seen on just 3 days
121	Great Tit	<i>Parus major</i>	Widespread, seen in small numbers on 6 days
122	Eurasian Nuthatch	<i>Sitta europaea</i>	Recorded on 2 days in mosquito wood with 3 birds on one day
123	Short-toed Treecreeper	<i>Certhia brachydactyla</i>	A pair seen feeding 3 young at mosquito wood gave great views and we were amazed to see the strange behaviour of the young huddled together
124	(Eurasian) Penduline Tit	<i>Remiz pendulinus</i>	Fantastic looks at one collecting nesting material plus sightings on 3 other days where birds gave superb views. Nests were also seen
125	Golden Oriole	<i>Oriolus oriolus</i>	Super looks at male sat in dead tree and others seen flying over. Recorded on 6 days the calls were heard almost everywhere we went
126	Red-backed Shrike	<i>Lanius collurio</i>	Fairly common and seen at a variety of sites on 5 days, with a maximum of 12 seen in 1 day
127	Lesser Grey Shrike	<i>Lanius minor</i>	Superb looks at several birds in full breeding plumage on 2 days. Maximum of 6 on one day
128	Eurasian Jay	<i>Garrulus glandarius</i>	Recorded on 3 days with a couple near the lodge
129	Black-billed Magpie	<i>Pica pica</i>	Widespread and common and seen everyday
130	Eurasian Jackdaw	<i>Corvus monedula</i>	Seen on 3 days with biggest group of 20 birds
131	Rook	<i>Corvus frugilegus</i>	A few seen on 3 separate days
132	Hooded Crow	<i>Corvus corone cornix</i>	Widespread and common and easily seen every day
133	Common Raven	<i>Corvus corax</i>	Just one seen by Frank on one day
134	Common Starling	<i>Sturnus vulgaris</i>	Common and widespread and seen everyday
135	House Sparrow	<i>Passer domesticus</i>	Common and widespread and seen everyday
136	Eurasian Tree Sparrow	<i>Passer montanus</i>	Reasonably common and seen in small numbers at many sites on 6 days
137	Chaffinch	<i>Fringilla coelebs</i>	Seen in small numbers on everyday
138	European Serin	<i>Serinus serinus</i>	At least 4 seen in small town when searching for Syrian Woodpecker
139	European Greenfinch	<i>Carduelis chloris</i>	A few seen on 5 separate days
140	European Goldfinch	<i>Carduelis carduelis</i>	Ones and twos seen at various sites on 6 days
141	Eurasian Linnet	<i>Carduelis cannabina</i>	A pair at mud pond 2 eluded almost everyone
142	Hawfinch	<i>Coccothraustes coccothraustes</i>	Seen on 5 days including bird feeding in mosquito forest, one near lodge, also flew over at mud pond 2, and seen near corncrake fields
143	Yellowhammer	<i>Emberiza citrinella</i>	Seen on 3 days the best views were near lodge
144	Rock Bunting	<i>Emberiza cia</i>	A very nice male was scoped in the Bukk hills
145	Reed Bunting	<i>Emberiza schoeniclus</i>	Just 2 birds were seen at two sites during tour
146	Corn Bunting	<i>Miliaria calandra</i>	Common and widespread and seen everyday

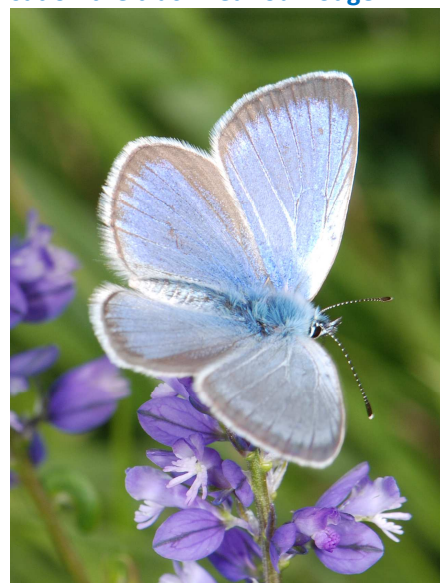

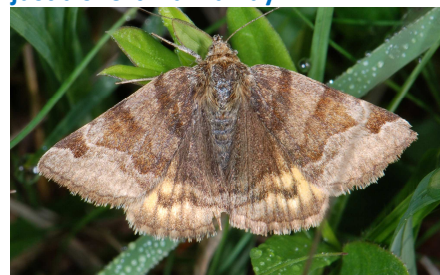

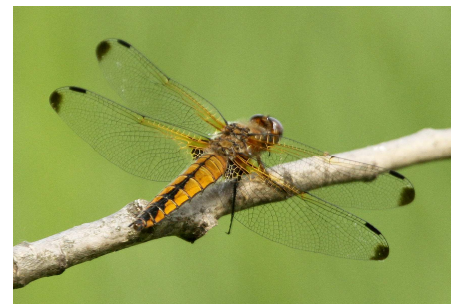

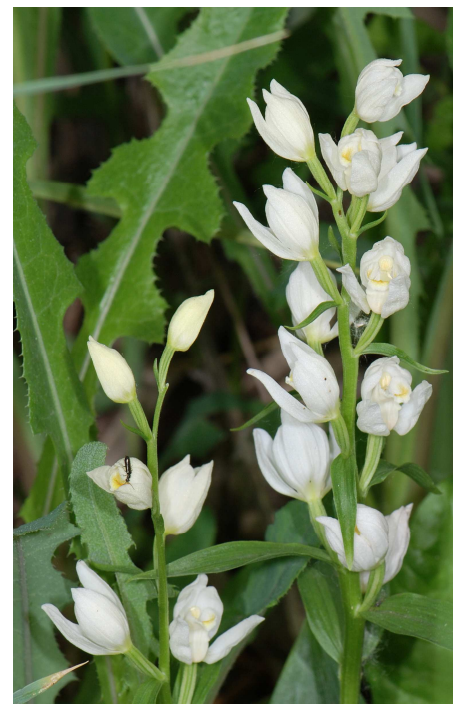
