This was a great trip packed with great birds, great people, and amazing landscapes. The top birds of the trip as voted by all participants are below and I do hope to go back guiding in Guyana soon... love this country!

## Highlights and top sightings:

**Rufous Potoo** was undoubtedly THE BIRD OF THE TRIP with double votes than **Red Siskin**. These two species require a bit of a special effort to go and see them, so they earned their votes. Then the 3<sup>rd</sup> place is shared between **Sun Parakeets** and **Giant Anteater**, which is quite fair to be honest. The rarity of **Pelzelin's Tody-Tyrant** makes it earn the 4<sup>th</sup> place while the magnificent **Crimson Topaz** goes 5<sup>th</sup>. The experience with the **Rufous-winged Ground-Cuckoo** and the **Sharp-tailed Ibis** got them sharing place #6 and a couple of **Cotingas** also share the 7<sup>th</sup> place: **Capuchinbird** and **Guianan Cock-of-the-rock** along with **Flavescent Warbler** (wtf! jajaja). The last 8<sup>th</sup> place is shared by many, including the amazing **Guianan Puffbird** and the crazy point-blank views of **Spotted Antpitta**, as well as so many good bats observations and **Fork-tailed Flycatchers**, **Ringed Kingfishers** and the electric **Spangled Cotinga**. A special mention has to be done to **Rufescent Tiger-Heron** and **Short-tailed Pygmy-Tyrant** someone said... jejeje.



## October 18

As all clients got here one day earlier, we then decided to make a quick visit to the Botanical Gardens in the afternoon and it was way worth! After checking the West Indian Manatees, we spent quite some time studying the different Amazon parrots like Yellow-crowned, Orange-winged, Festive, and Mealy as well as being able to check differences between Great Kiskadees and Rusty-margined Flycatchers. We did find a couple of the Guianan Shield endemic White-bellied Piculet that put on a show for the group, while a Great Horned Owl was just hanging out before being severely mobbed by a Grey-lined Hawk just in front of our eyes. We then keep on the move and eventually secured good views of the other endemics target at the gardens that was Blood-colored Woodpecker, as a couple was active nearby a nest that Leon our local guide had found a week ago with some of my Colombian friends that were here birding a bit and scouting for a neat project similar to our The Birders campaign in Colombia. We also nailed down a few herons, Limpkin, jacanas, Blue-gray and Palm Tanagers, and the most common regular suspects that make the gardens quite an entertaining place to start our trip.

## October 19

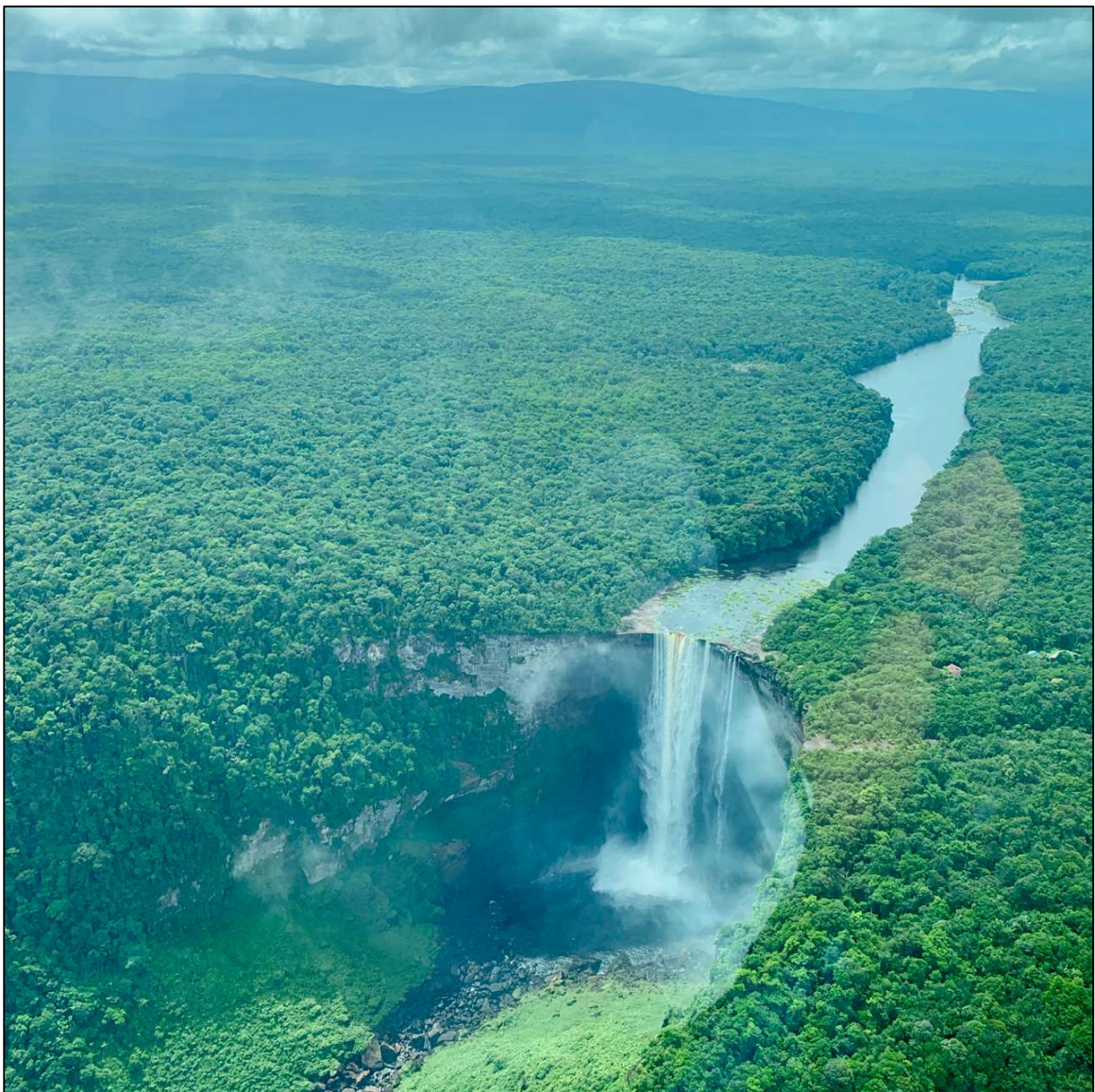
This morning we went quite early to the Mahaica River area and started our boat trip quickly enjoying our first group of the prehistoric looking Hoatzin; we studied them in detail and kept moving along the river that produced stunning close views of Blood-colored Woodpecker as well as a couple of the shiny Green-tailed Jacamar. Probably some 15+ Little Cuckoo individuals we got to see, and some were super cooperative for photographs. We played with a couple of Silvered Antbirds, and only the skulky female allowed to be seen by some of the group. We visited a Hoatzin nest, and we could enjoy a couple of chicks and more adults at close range before returning to Narish's home our boat driver where Shanty his wife was waiting for us with the most spectacular breakfast ever made of chicken curry, curry potatoes,



and dhal puri. We got to see a huge Jabiru Stork flying by and we left so we could make some stops along the way back for some more goodies. An impromptu encounter with a couple of the habitat-range-restricted **Rufous Crab-Hawk** entertained us for a while alongside the road, and a couple more stops along the seawall delivered the badly wanted Scarlet Ibis. We got back to hotel for lunch and in the afternoon the group went with Leon to some coastal areas to enjoy loads of waders, terns, sandpipers and the like while I recovered from a little funny stomach situation.

**October 20**

Today we had a relaxed start as we had to go to Ogle Airport to take our charter flight to Surama with a stop at the amazing Kaieteur Falls. We flew above the most amazing “broccoli” vastness over endless forest and upon landing in the falls, we had a couple of hours only to move around.



We tried to nail down some Guianan Cock-of-the-rocks but there were none to be seen so we kept moving across this landscape while getting flabbergasted about being walking on the oldest rocks of this planet that provide habitat for such a unique flora and fauna. We enjoyed some bromeliads, orchids, mosses, and Clusia plants, all endemic and eventually reached the first viewpoint for the waterfall. Our local guide quickly found us a **Golden Rocket Frog** in of the huge tank bromeliads and we continued our route. We tried again for Cock-of-the-rock without success, but we enjoyed amazing views of Rufous-crowned Elaenia while we were learning more from the *Drosera* sundews found in the soggy areas around.



We took off, enjoying again breathtaking views of the falls, and after 30 minutes we were landing in Surama indigenous Macushi community. We checked-in, had lunch and a bit of a rest, and there we were enjoying Swallow-winged Puffbirds at the entrance of the Burro Burro Trail. We went in and I whistled a Great Jacamar that responded immediately allowing for great scope views. We kept going just for a few hundred meters and after some prospection playback, a couple of Rufous-winged Ground-Cuckoos responded! We played with this couple for around half an hour, and even both approached quite close from both sides of the trail, we could not lure them in enough to be seen. Ground-Cuckoo 1 – Sunrise Birding 0. We got amazing views of Northern Tawny-bellied Screech-Owl that came to Leon's playback and at a Kinkajou I spotted. The scope allowed to enjoy better views of Common Pauraque, Jupiter and three of its Galilean moons, and amazing Saturn and its rings that was a lifer for most of the group.



### October 21

Today we left quite early for the Harpy Eagle trail area; we walked there and scanned the area for almost a couple of hours without any success. We got amazing views of Guianan Warbling Antbird and my birthday gift came in the form of one of my brothers, David Ascanio from Venezuela, that was with Mike Braun and a Smithsonian Institution / VENT group lead by Ron Allicock, and we crossed paths by pure chance in the middle of the jungle here. We then came back to the road slowly getting views of Paradise Jacamar, Capuchinbird, and even some got glimpses of

Crimson Fruitcrow. We then hit the man road and visited the nest of **Long-tailed Potoo** where a chick was posing nicely. Subsequently, we went to the area where we always look for Great Potoo near Surama and in less than 10 minutes found a beautiful individual in the subcanopy. Got to lodge for lunch and a bit of rest, and in the midafternoon, we went again to the Burro Burro trail where it was kind of quiet, but anyways we got us great scope views of Black-spotted Barbets and some **Puma tracks**. We came back to the



lodge to find we were dining outside next to a bonfire as the guys from the lodge wanted to give a gift and celebrate my birthday with cake and rum and a special night... quite special indeed!



### October 22

We left Surama early morning so we could do some stops in the road that actually rewarded us with great views of **Crimson Fruitcrow** and its relatives: Pompadour Cotinga and Spangled Cotinga. We kept going and made a stop at a Long-tailed Potoo nest where a chick is just roadside and offering a show. After enjoying the Potoo, we went into the Cock-of-the-road trail and got to the lek, where we spent almost 2 hours waiting for and enjoying these spectacular beasts. We finally reached Iwokrama River Lodge for lunch and after some rest we went into one of the trails that was a little quiet but rewarded us with point blank views of Spotted Antpitta, a bird you don't normally see that well or that often. The icing on the cake came in the form of Ladder-tailed Nightjars that we went into the Essequibo River on boats to see close and personal.





### October 23

Today we had a very rainy morning that started around 3 am with a huge thunder that woke up everyone, so we did some birding from the lodge dining area and only around 9 am we could go and do some trails not without being delayed by Green and **Black-necked Aracaris**, and plenty of Blue-headed Parrots in the open gap where the lodge is located. A mixed flock allowed some views of Plain Xenops, and even an Ash-winged Antwren and a Todd's Antwren in the scopes. In the forest trails we encountered an army ant swarm with plenty of White-plumed and Rufous-throated Antbirds that we could enjoy in the scope and also got close by to see the ants and learn more about that amazing Neotropical natural history phenomenon. In the afternoon we went to catch up and do our boat trip to Turtle Mountain that was delayed this morning because of the rains. Black Caracara was in the dock as well as Sanker, the Black Caiman that wanders



around. Black-collared and White-banded Swallows were in the river and a stop for Guianan Streaked Antwren also provided plenty of Red-capped Cardinals. We got to Turtle Mountain and played for a while with an Amazonian Grosbeak that did not cooperate much, and once in the main clearing we finally got great scope views of **Amazonian Pygmy Owl**, along with posing Red-throated Caracaras and a small flock of Sapphire-rumped Parrotlets that silently came to a Cecropia tree. We navigated back to lodge seeing a Spectacled Caiman in the way.

### October 24

This morning we hit again the Capuchinbird lekking area and we finally got decent views of these amazing birds. We then went back for breakfast and left the lodge making some stops in the way to Atta Lodge. Our first stop was for an impromptu Crimson Topaz astonishing male and after that we went into a trail where a couple of years ago, John Christian and I had shown Leon and Ron a lifer that we were looking for today again. After some 15 minutes walking, we reached the area where the mega Rufous Potoo was day roosting and we study this animal for at least 30+ minutes getting to see, understand, and enjoy why it changed its generic name from the typical *Nyctibius* to *Phyllaemulor*... what a sighting we had! We then reached Atta Lodge and got to lunch and to enjoy the life hummingbird feeders (first in the country, and only a year old) that delivered amazing Rufous-throated Sapphires, Crimson Topaz females, Grey-breasted Sabrewings, among other goodies. Afternoon got us playing with a couple of Dusky Purpletufts before going to the Canopy Walkway where we got some nice additions like Golden-collared Woodpecker, Todd's and Spot-tailed



Antwrens, etc. We hit the road before dinner and got us Spectacled Owls and another mega: White-winged Potoo!

### October 25

We started early today and some Guianan Toucanets and Marail Guans were not allowing us to have breakfast as they were showing up in the main lodge gap, so everyone was in the scopes. We then walked to the main road nailing down Purple-breasted Cotinga, Pied Puffbird, and Spotted Tanagers. We studied some Forest Elaenias and got to see a plethora of birds attracted to pygmy-owl tapes around the bridge including the good-looking target White-throated Manakin. Guianan Streaked Antwren was also in the bridge area.



We then went back North in the main road towards a white sand patch where first bird we got was a lifer for the whole group including Leon and myself: Pelzel's Tody-Tyrant that was



recently found here. We also got the range-restricted usual -but mega- suspects like Black Manakin, **Guianan (or Olive) Schiffornis**, and the always stunning Bronzy Jacamar. We went back to lodge for lunch and then in the afternoon after enjoying some birding in the open gap of the lodge, we went into a trail that was a little quiet but delivered some views of Guianan Red-Cotinga for some of the group, and scope beautiful views of Black-faced Hawk. We this time drove a bit South in the main road and sunset got us again seeing planets on the scope and looking a lot to the sky. A couple of good-looking **Black-banded Owls** responded very well to tape and showed nicely.





## October 26

This morning we went to the white-sand patch first thing to try again for the Saffron-crested Tyrant-Manakin we did not get on the previous day, and our luck kept the same with this bird. We got amazing Spotted Puffbird (quite rare finding here as it is normally a Várzea species). We got the Guianan Schiffornis again and calling, and at the main road plenty of Band-rumped Swifts were flying low and around so we could study their field-marks. We birded the main road all the way to Caiman House in the Rupununi savannas scoring some cool first for the trip: Double-striped Thick-knees, White-tailed Hawk, American Kestrel, Aplomado Falcon and Bat Falcon. A rattlesnake entertained us on a casual road stop before reaching Caiman House, our lodge for the next couple of days.



## October 27

Today we left early to the savannas near Caiman House looking for a very special beast, the Giant Anteater. We had sent some trackers earlier before the break of dawn both on a motorbike and horse-riding but even with the extra help we could not find one... the savanna had been quite rainy in the past week so moving around was hard and we also missed the Crested Doradito and the Bearded Tachuri as we couldn't access their areas even in our sturdy 4x4s. We got amazing views of Great Horned Owls and White-tailed Nightjars roosting and worked on an Ocellated



Crake that responded to tape and then came back to lodge for lunch and some rest. In the afternoon we did a great boat trip on the Rupununi River scoring Ringed, Amazon, and American Pygmy Kingfishers and the first Hooded Tanagers of the trip as well as the only Pale-tipped Tyrannulet and White-bellied Antbird of the trip. A Collared Forest-Falcon was calling while we enjoyed the huge floating water lilies along with the usual nocturnal suspects like Lesser and Nacunda Nighthawks and a Blackish Nightjar.

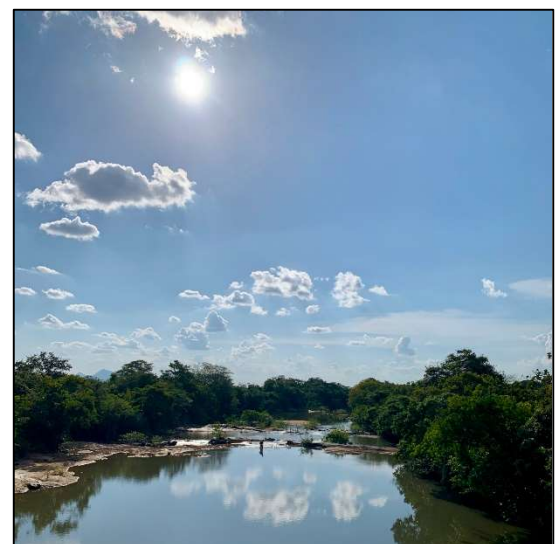
### October 28

We left Caiman House at 4am and drove for 4,5 solid hours to reach Karasabai where we were going to be looking for the rare mega **Sun Parakeets**. Anyways, while in the road we made a stop for breakfast that also got us a Giant Anteater mom with a big baby on top giving us a show, a very special moment indeed. We reached Karasabai and headed into the mountains and after some stops for Burnished-buffed Tanager, Grey Seedeater and Blue-and-black Grassquit we were on the area we needed to track down these parakeets. For our surprise, Renzford our driver spotted them just in the other side of the creek in some bushes near a corn plot so in less than a minute we were enjoying these jewels in the scoped and having amazing point-blank views. We spent more than an hour with these birds, a flock of nine, and went back to the cars also nailing down Orange-backed Troupial and Rufous-browed Peppershrike. Got some rest in town before lunch and then drove some more hours to Manari Ranch where we got exhausted but super excited for having seen one of the coolest rarest Neotropical parrots. As we got some energy, after quick showers we went around the gardens nailing down some common species and entertaining ourselves photographing and studying a lovely Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl that was super obliging.



### October 29

We visited Wichabai in the morning as the local researchers that work with Red Siskin have had some good sightings in recent days at that locality. We spent the full morning there and got no signs of the birds. Anyways, we got some good birds like Nacunda Nighthawk and Rufous-throated Sapphire. Finally, around this site we were able to catch up with Sharp-tailed Ibis and got us the only White-barred Piculet of the trip. We decided to drive quite a lot to try our luck in the afternoon at Sand Creek even that meant a late return to lodge but the Red Siskins are way, way worth. We were rewarded as we also catch up with Bearded Tachuri and got our only Chestnut-vented Conebill of the trip. Finch's Euphonias were also very





vocal. We waited and waited at the traditional place without luck and almost at the end of the afternoon, we enjoyed a nice flock of the flabbergasting rare and endangered Red Siskins. Elater, we drove back home to Manari Ranch where we arrived for a late dinner.

### **October 30**

On our last morning we did the classical Manari Ranch birding visiting the Iran River in the border with Brazil... we scored relatively easy our two main targets for the morning, the Rio Branco Antbird and the Hoary-throated Spinetail, a couple of very range-restricted species that are common here. Zone-tailed Hawk, White-fringed Antwren and Rufous-tailed Jacamar were a show too, but nothing compared to the scope views we had of Pale-legged Horneros. Slate-headed Tody-Flycatcher was also a first for the trip and a nice addition. We came back to ranch, packed, and had lunch and flew in the afternoon back to Georgetown to finish our trip.
