Summary:

Our Northwest Argentina Tour was simply fabulous! Famed for its unspoilt scenery our journey had us experience the mighty Andes, and through many scenic and special corners of the biomes that compose this fascinating region of Argentina: The lush Yungas foothill forests up to 2200m, the dry bushy valleys of El Monte, the thorny scrub of the Chaco in the eastern lowlands and the fascinating high Andes habitats (Puna, over 3400m). Conditions were hotter than expected but this did not deter our wonderful group of birders. Most of our targets were seen, and those few that we missed was not for want of trying! This is certainly not a destination for those interested in culinary delights and meals sometimes proved interesting to say the least. However, the bird species were varied and spectacular with many wonderful highlights. With our super guide Mario at the helm, we pursued the spectacular, the rare and the photogenic species of this part of Argentina. Eduardo backed up Mario where he could and of course was still an incredible asset with his knowledge of bird calls, even in a country new to him. We got 384 species of birds, including 6 Argentine endemics and several others near endemics.

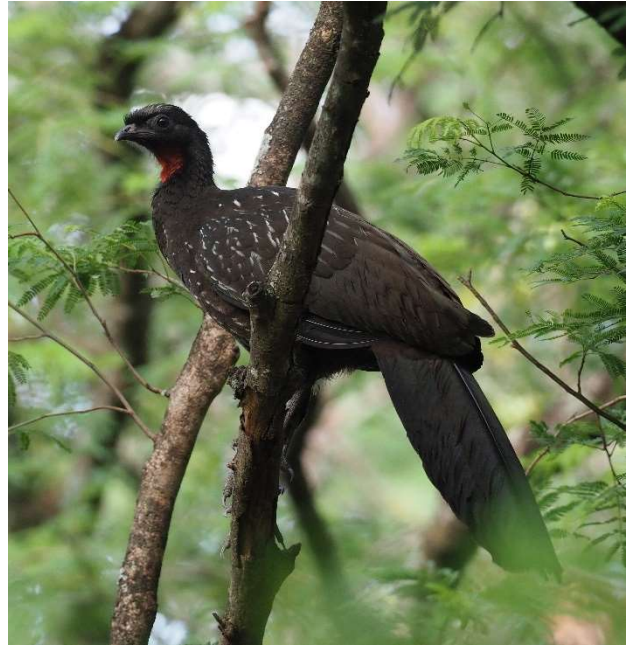
Day 0 - 02nd Dec, Pre tour to Costanera Sur

After meeting the group at hotel in downtown Buenos Aires, we set off for an afternoon visit to the convenient Costanera Sur Municipal Park. This was an additional excursion planned because of domestic flight times changing and allowing this afternoon and the following morning to do some local birding. Our relaxed birding session covered mainly the wetlands areas within park. Here we got nice looks at **Rosy-billed Pochards**, Coscoroba and Black-necked Swans, as well as Silver and Yellow-billed Teals, Lake Duck, and the uncommon **Black-headed Duck**, a unique species among waterfowl as it is an obligate brood parasite, meaning the female does not build a nest but lays its eggs the nests of other birds. Other species noted here included Pied-billed and White-tufted Grebes, Spot-flanked Gallinule, White-winged, Red-gartered and Red-fronted Coots, Fulvous Whistling Duck, Bare-faced Ibis, Rufescent Tiger Heron, Black-crowned Night-Heron, Cocoi and Striated Herons. Both Harris's Hawk and Chimango Caracara's flew around and further searching revealed Limpkins and Picazuro Pigeons. Noisy parakeets drew our attention to White-eyed, Nanday and Monk, while other birds along the scrub and tree line included Green-barred (Golden-breasted) Woodpecker, Narrow-billed Woodcreeper, Masked Gnatcatcher, White-winged Becard, Red-crested Cardinal and Golden-billed Saltator. A great afternoon of birding we returned to our hotel.



Day 1 - 03rd Dec Costanera Sur - Fly to Tucuman

This morning we decided a repeat visit the Costanera Sur Park for a couple hours. This time we walked around the lakes taking a track in the shaded woodland. This had us find different species including Black-and-rufous Warbling Finch, Golden-crowned Warbler, Sooty-fronted Spinetail, White-crested Tyrannulet, Tropical Parula, Double-collared Seedeater, Yellow-browed Tyrant and a nice Dark-billed Cuckoo. Several hummingbirds were also seen with both Gilded Sapphire and Glittering-bellied Emerald. Back at the hotel, we took lunch and then moved to the airport to take the afternoon flight to Tucuman, set in the eastern slope of the foothills of the Andes. Once in Tucuman, we met our local guide Mario and our driver Carlos to continue driving for a couple hours to reach the touristic little town of Tafi del Valle, at 2000m elevation. We arrived there in the evening, having crossed a beautiful Yungas Forest on our way up where we were able to make just a very quick roadside stop at a site where we saw **Yungas Guan** and a Black Phoebe on the river.



Day 2 - 04th Dec Tafi del Valle

Today we had the full day to explore the Tafi del Valle. Our first early morning stop beside the tree line surrounding Tafi, proved to be a good site that provided a number of excellent birds. The much sought after **Tucuman Mountain Finch** showed well, alongside Yellow-striped Brushfinch, Cream-winged Cinclodes, White-throated Tyrannulet, Blue-and-yellow Tanager, Brown-capped Whitestart, Black-backed Grosbeak, Brown-capped Tit-Spinetail, Crested Becard and Grey-hooded Parakeet. Among the hummingbirds were Sparkling Violetear and our first Red-tailed Comet. Moving on we drove higher into Puna habitat, which consists of high-altitude montane grasslands and shrub. Here we connected with an Andean Tinamou and several raptors that included Variable Hawk, Black-chested



Buzzard-Eagle, Mountain Caracara and of course the king of the skies, Andean Condor. The habitat here did not disappoint and we soon found the endemic Moreno's Ground Dove, as well as Puna Canastero, Buff-breasted Earthcreeper, Andean Flicker, Lesser and Black-billed Shrike-Tyrants, White-browed Chat-Tyrant, Band-tailed Sierra Finch and Hellmayr's Pipit. More **Red-tailed Comets** were seen and we also spotted an Andean Red Fox.



In the afternoon, we drove to lower elevations, first covering the Yungas, a transitional narrow band of forest between the Andean highlands and the eastern forests. Roadside stops along the La Angostura River produced the localized Rufous-throated Dipper, although it took a bit of a search. We of course found other distractions such as Andean Tyrant, Common Bush-Tanager, Andean Slaty Thrush, Fawn-breasted Tanager and eventually a close pair of stunning Torrent Duck with chicks! Fantastic! We then returned to Tafi where we still had time for a nice stop by the lagoon La Angostura. Here we added Andean and Grey-headed Gulls, Snowy-crowned Tern, Andean Goose, Andean Coot, Red-Shoveler, Cinnamon Teal, Great Grebe and few others. What a day!

Day 3 - 05th Dec Tafi del Valle - Cafayate

Today was to be a fairly long travel day interspersed with birding stops along the way. We started with an early morning look around Tafi (Las Carreras) which provided us with nice looks at Andean



Lapwing, Streak-throated Bush Tyrant, Black-backed Grosbeak, more Red-tailed Comets and a superb performance from a **White-browed Tapaculo**. We then set off around the western side of the Sierra de Aconquija and continued north through Argentine wine country to the small town of Cafayate in the Province of Salta. The high passage of Abra Infernillo took us into the Monte desert valleys full of cactus (*Trichocereus* sp.) where we had a few productive birding stops. The endemic Steinbach's Canastero showed itself, as did Rusty-vented Canastero, Greenish Yellow-Finch, Grey-hooded, Ash-

breasted and Mourning Sierra Finches, Rufous-sided Warbling Finch, Grey-hooded Parakeet, Streak-fronted Thornbird and Patagonian Mockingbird. Further along we took our picnic lunch near Amaicha del Valle and specialties like the endemic White-throated Cacholote, plus good views of Elegant-

crested Tinamou, White-fronted Woodpecker, Variable Oriole, Greater Wagtail-Tyrant and White Monjita. The final stretch to Cafayate in the afternoon was the icing on the cake when a strategic stop allowed us fantastic views of a huge group (hundreds) of **Burrowing Parrots**. We also got our first sighting of White-tipped Plantcutter, and added Spot-winged Pigeon, Spectacled Tyrant, Long-tailed Meadowlark and Pampa Finch to our day list. Another very special endemic the Sandy Gallito was also found, and we finish the day with a smart Ringed Warbling Finch, a pair of Red Tanagers, Checkered Woodpecker and Chaco Earthcreeper. Our excellent day was topped off by a nice evening dinner in Cafayate.



Day 4 - 06th Dec Cafayate - Coronel Moldes

In the early morning our first stop was in good Chaco habitat just outside Cafayate. One of our main targets the **Many-colored Chaco Finch** gave stunning very showy views. Plenty of other birds kept us busy with sightings of Stripe-crowned Spinetail, Tufted Tit-Spinetail, White-fronted and Checkered Woodpeckers, White-bellied Tyrannulet, Greater Wagtail-Tyrant, Band-tailed Seed eater, Ringed Warbling Finch, Ultramarine Grosbeak and Golden-billed Saltator. Moving on we travelled through impressive scenery of reddish mountains and cliffs, where brief stops produced Andean Swift, more Burrowing Parrots; another pair of White-tipped Plantcutter and a White-winged Black Tyrant. As we approached Coronel Moldes, a small town and municipality in Salta Province, we had our first attempts at finding the shy Crested Gallito in amongst the dry bushy habitat. Part of our group got decent views of one at a second site we tried, but it was now very hot and we had more



chances! Despite the heat we added Red-pileated Finch, Short-billed Canastero, Mitred Parakeet and an obliging Great Rufous Woodcreeper. Lunch was at an interesting forested roadside 'tienda' stop, and was enlivened by sightings of some Ultramarine Grosbeaks, Stripe-crowned Spinetail, Plush-crested Jay and Moss-backed Sparrow. We then continued our drive to Coronel Moldes and checked in to our hotel. Our afternoon session was in nearby dry bushland where we got very good close views of the most wanted **Black-legged Seriema**! Also present were Black-crested Finch, a lovely Cream-backed Woodpecker, Chaco Chachalaca, Variable Antshrike, Crowned Slaty Flycatcher, Pearly-vented Tody-Tyrant and at last, an obliging Crested Gallito. Another great day!



Day 5 - 07th Dec Coronel Moldes - Los Cardones NP - Salta

This morning we set off on the drive to Los Cardones National Park, which made for a very enjoyable and scenic day of birding. On our journey up, we had a brief stop in an area of Yungas Forest in the foothills. We enjoyed good sightings Yungas Guan and Mitred Parakeet before continuing up above the tree line, where we spent most of the day. Andean Condor, and Andean Swift flew overhead and regular stops in areas of arid scrub eventually took us up to the high plains (3500m) of the park where we arrived around noon. More sightings were had of our favourite hummingbird the Red-tailed Comet, plus a good supporting list that included Brown-capped Tit-Spinetail, Cream-winged Cinclodes, Streak-fronted Thornbird, **White-tipped Plantcutter**, White-throated Tyrannulet, White-winged Black Tyrant, Andean Tyrant, Black-billed Shrike-Tyrant,



Streak-throated Bush-Tyrant, White-browed Chat-Tyrant, Band-tailed Seedeater, Chiguanco Thrush, Grey-hooded Sierra Finch, Rufous-sided Warbling Finch and Black-backed Grosbeak. Several nice additions to our list included a glimpse of Rock Earthcreeper, great looks at the range restricted Zimmer's Tapaculo, a very nice surprise in the area in the form of an Olive-crowned Crescentchest, plus Rusty Flowerpiercer, Rufous-banded Miner and Maquis Canastero.

We tried very hard to find the uncommon Rufous-bellied Mountain Tanager, but unfortunately there were no signs of it today. However, the high meadows in the National Park offered a few other nice species such as Least Seedsnipe, Golden-spotted Ground-Dove, Slender-billed Miner, Band-tailed and Ash-breasted Sierra Finches and a brief female Andean Hillstar that was nesting at one of the headquarters' buildings. Heading down from the national park, we drove north to reach our nice hotel in San Lorenzo.

Day 6 - 08th Dec Selva Montana - Joaquín Víctor Gonzales

With a little time of birding before and after breakfast we enjoyed the sunrise before checking out the Yungas area around Selva Montana. Yungas Guans were found and then Scaly-headed Parrot, Turquoise-fronted Amazon, White-bellied Hummingbird, Rough-legged Tyrannulet, Brown-capped Whitestart and Plush-crested Jays. From here we made our way east to the lower lands of Joaquín Víctor Gonzales, in the Chaco. Here a completely different and diverse habitat meant a whole new array



of birds awaited us. We drove a couple hours to our first stop in the Chaco and found the temperature to be getting very warm. Despite this we still managed to find a few birds in this first area, including Stripe-backed Antbird, **Black-capped Warbling Finch**, Sooty-fronted Spinetail, White-fronted Woodpecker, Greater Wagtail-Tyrant, Masked Gnatcatcher, Red-pileated Finch and a female Blue-tufted Starthroat. On our continuing journey to Joaquín Gonzales, we made another stop for lunch before reaching the town. It was getting just too hot now and not a single bird was moving. Arriving in JVG, we checked into the hotel and later in the afternoon went birding in a fragmented area of Chaco nearby. We stayed here until the evening and despite the heat, birding was very good adding a

bunch of new birds to our expanding list. We started with Tataupa Tinamou, and then the amazing Quebracho Crested-Tinamou, followed by a good selection that included Scimitar-billed Woodcreeper, Large Elaenia, Lark-like Brushrunner, Brown Cacholote, Plain Inezia, Ferruginous Pygmy Owl, Chaco Puffbird, Little Thornbird, Suiriri Flycatcher, and a nice Crested Hornero. Screaming Cowbird and Grassland Yellow-Finch were also added as we awaited nightfall in order to search for a few nocturnal species. The site provided us with Tropical Screech-Owl and nice male Scissor-tailed Nightjar. We also heard Little Nightjar and Common Potoo, besides trying for Chaco Owl, a really tough one to find in the area, no luck this time.

Day 7 - 09th Dec Joaquín Víctor Gonzales - Calilegua NP

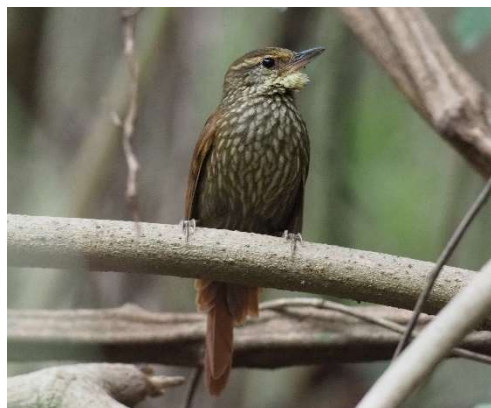
An early morning visit at Joaquín Víctor Gonzales, had us explore a different area of the fragmented Chaco. We spent a couple of hours here and built up quite a list with Chaco Chachalaca, Aplomado Falcon, Blue-crowned Parakeet, Turquoise-fronted Amazon, a stunning male Blue-tufted Starthroat, Chaco Puffbird, White-barred Piculet, a beautiful pair of Cream-backed Woodpeckers, Checkered Woodpecker, Great Antshrike, Stripe-crowned Spinetail, Small-billed and Large Elaenias, Southern Beardless Tyrannulet, Suriri Flycatcher, Crowned Slaty Flycatcher, Solitary Cacique, Variable Oriole,

Red-crested Cardinal, Black-capped Warbling Finch, Bluish-grey Saltator (formally Greyish Saltator) and Ultramarine Grosbeak. We also tried for some of the local rarities, like Spot-winged Falconet and Black-bodied Woodpecker, but unfortunately neither of them showed up. Moving from JVG to our next destination of Calilegua National Park, allowed us to have the late morning and noon birding around the reservoir El Tunal. Back into the waterbirds we were soon seeing a great selection such as White-faced and Fulvous Whistling Ducks, Brazilian Duck, Ringed Teal, two female Masked Ducks, gorgeous Rosy-billed Pochard, Pied-billed, **White-tufted** and Great Grebes. Nearby we picked out Wood Stork, Bare-faced and White-faced Ibises, Cocoi Heron, Snail Kite, Common Gallinule, Western Osprey, White-backed Stilt, Greater Yellowlegs, Large-billed Tern, Picui Ground-Dove, Ringed Kingfisher and a Moss-backed Sparrow. It was then time to drive north into the Yungas area of Calilegua National Park. Our first immersion into this wonderful area had nice looks at Golden-collared Macaw and Green-cheeked Parakeet, plus Sick's Swift, Toco Toucan, Ochre-cheeked Spinetail, Streaked Xenops, Olivaceous Woodcreeper, Sclater's Tyrannulet, Ochre-faced Tody-Flycatcher, Purple-throated Euphonia, Two-banded Warbler, Orange-headed Tanager and Plush-crested Jay. Another great selection of birds for the day.



Day 8 - 10th Dec Calilegua NP

Today we set off for a full day on the hills of Calilegua National Park. We had a busy start to the day among the tall Yungas Forest, mostly between 1000m to 1600m of elevation. Highlights here included Swallow-tailed Kites, Short-tailed Hawk, Golden-collared Macaw, Mitred and Green-cheeked Parakeets, Squirrel Cuckoo, White-bellied and Speckled Hummingbirds, Blue-crowned Trogon, Toco Toucan, White-barred Piculet, Dot-fronted and Golden-olive Woodpeckers, Azara's Spinetail, **Buff-browed Foliage-gleaner**, Giant Antshrike, the fascinating. This park is a stunning destination for birding and protects an important Yungas Cloud Forest habitat. Normally difficult to see a White-throated Antpitta



allowed simply great views! And as we continued to work our way through this habitat, we found Rough-legged Tyrannulet, Grey-headed, Slaty and Highland Elaenias, Mottled-cheeked Tyrannulet, Sepia-capped Flycatcher, Cinnamon Flycatcher, Rufous Casiornis, Dusky-capped Flycatcher, and then a young male **Yungas Manakin**. Along came the afternoon and birds were still coming. Green-backed and Crested Becards, Rufous-browed Peppershrike, Mountain Wren, Andean Slaty Thrush, Two-banded Warbler, Crested Oropendola, Golden-winged Cacique, White-browed Brushfinch, Orange-headed and Guira Tanagers, Chestnut-vented Conebill and Rusty-browed Warbling Finch.



Day 9 - 11th Dec Calilegua NP - Jujuy

Today we spent the morning covering the lowland transitional areas north of San Martin. Our first stop was beside a river and marsh, and provided us with birds like Roseate Spoonbill, Brazilian Teal,

Solitary Sandpiper, Green and Ringed Kingfishers. Along the edges of the marsh and scrub we found Sooty Tyrannulet, Black Phoebe, Lined Seed eater, Yellow-billed Cardinal, Greater Thornbird, Dark-billed Cuckoo, Unicolored Blackbird and Rufous-sided Crake, as well as Snail Kite. It's always good to keep looking up and we added Great Black Hawk, Bicolored Hawk. Moving on to other areas of scrubby woodland produced Grey-necked Wood Rail, Golden-collared Macaw, Toco Toucan, Rufous-fronted Thornbird, Crested Oropendola, Variable Oriole, Greyish Baywing, Orange-headed Tanager, Mouse-colored Tyrannulet and Black-capped Warbling Finch. It was then time for lunch in San Martin, after which we headed to the Yungas of Yala, in the foothills next to Jujuy. On arrival we visited the nice Potrero de Yala Provincial Park, where a good session of afternoon birding produced an all too brief Yungas Dove followed by White-collared Swift, Mitred Parakeet, White-bellied Hummingbird, Red-tailed Comet, Spot-breasted Thornbird, Rufous-capped Antshrike, Brown-capped Whitestart, Sclater's Tyrannulet, Streak-throated Bush-Tyrant, Plush-crested Jay, Hooded Siskin, Golden-winged Cacique, **Rust-and-yellow Tanager**, Rusty-browed Warbling Finch and a stunning Fulvous-headed Brushfinch. A little birding after dusk managed to find us a pair of Lyre-tailed Nightjar.



Day 10-12th Dec Calilegua NP - Yala

Today was going to be a full day of birding at Yala. We revisited the Potrero Park in the morning and



got pretty much the same set of birds compared to the previous day. A few nice additions included Scaly-headed Parrot, distant view of Rothschild's Swift and great sightings of mostly female Slender-tailed Woodstars. In the afternoon the birding improved and we finally managed to get Red-legged Seriema in a farm near our village. Heading back to Potrero we finally got long good views of the Yungas endemic **Red-faced Guan**, a bird that can often prove very difficult. Later, we enjoyed

more views of **Fulvous-headed Brushfinch**, Rusty-browed Warbling Finch, Mottle-cheeked Tyrannulet, Brown-capped Whitestart, Mountain Wren and few others. A night birding session at Potrero proved to be very rewarding as we got Band-winged Nightjar, Yungas Screech Owl and Yungas Pygmy Owl.



Day 11-13th Dec Yala - Tilcara

This morning we worked hard again to try and find Tucuman Amazon, which this time we managed to at least hear some in Yungas near Lozano. We spent more time in the lower part of this area and were

successful with two of our targets the Yungas Sparrow and handsome Black-and-chestnut Warbling Finch. Then later, we drove higher along the Humahuaca Valley heading up into the Andes. Our birdy picnic stop was beside a small lake, where we enjoyed several Roseate Spoonbills, Yellow-billed and Cinnamon Teals, Yellow-billed Pintail, Andean Coot, White-backed Stilt, a stunning male Red-tailed Comet and the ever-impressive Giant Hummingbird. Our next stop was at dry open habitat a little way before Tilcara. Here we managed a few nice species including Andean Condor, Grey-hooded Parakeet, Yellow-billed Tit-Tyrant, Patagonian Mockingbird, Band-tailed Sierra Finch, Rufous-sided Warbling Finch, Peregrine Falcon and White-winged Black Tyrant. Eventually we arrived in Tilcara where we checked a little marsh just by its entrance. A smart **Subtropical Doradito** took pride of place and was backed up with Plumbeous Rail and Spectacled Tyrant. After checking into our hotel, a late afternoon session provided a few more species regularly found in the Monte desert. Here we enjoyed Giant Hummingbird, Rusty-vented Canastero, White-tipped Plantcutter, Brown-backed Mockingbird, Grey-hooded Sierra Finch and Mourning Sierra Finch.



Day 12- 14th Dec Tilcara - Abra Pampa - Yavi

Today we set off towards Yavi in the north with full day of birding around Monumento Natural Laguna de Pozuelos and Lagunillas. This Puna habitat in the high Andes plains at (3.500m) is not only vast and



scenic but it also holds some exciting birds. And our first stop near Abra Pampa was indeed very exciting. It's not often that you can watch three species of flamingo in one small lake. But here we were treated to this wonderful sight as Chilean, **Andean** and James's Flamingos all performed for us. The lakes here attracted a good variety of expected water loving birds and we soon found Puna, Cinnamon and Yellow-billed Teals, Yellow-billed and White-cheeked Pintails, Andean Duck, Crested Duck, Andean Coot, Andean Gull, Puna Ibis, both Greater and Lesser Yellowlegs, Andean Avocet, Wilson's Phalarope and a dainty Andean Negrito. More stops were made in the dry Puna before and at the Pozuelos Lagoon



which provided a bunch of new birds. It was great to find an Ornate Tinamou, while other exciting finds included D'Orbigny's Chat-Tyrant, Straight-billed and Rock Earthcreepers, Common and Puna Miners, White-winged Cinclodes, Plain-mantled Tit-Spinetail, Cordilleran and Rusty-vented Canasteros, Golden-spotted Ground Dove, Mountain Parakeet, Streak-fronted Thornbird, Black-billed Shrike Tyrant, Ochre-naped Ground Tyrant, Brown-backed Mockingbird, Black Siskin, Black-hooded, Mourning, Ash-breasted and Band-tailed Sierra Finches, Puna and Greenish Yellow Finches. We also added a very cute looking **Mountain Vizcacha** to our

mammal list. Our main target was then found along the shores of the main lake, and we were delighted with four Puna Plovers. Also, here we spotted some distant flamingos, coots, Baird's Sandpiper, many Andean Avocets, White-backed Stilt, Crested Duck and few others species we had previously spotted. Later on, we made a visit to the smaller Lagunillas, and here we were extremely lucky to find the rare Hooded Coot, a species that is only around if the water levels and conditions are perfect. Also here were Giant Coot and Andean Goose. To complete the quite long loop drive, we got great looks at the Puna



race of **Lesser Rhea**, including one with several chicks. After a last stop in the bordering town of La Quiaca, we finally arrived at Yavi, where we were welcomed by a group of very range restricted Citron-headed Yellow Finches.

Day 13 - 15th Dec

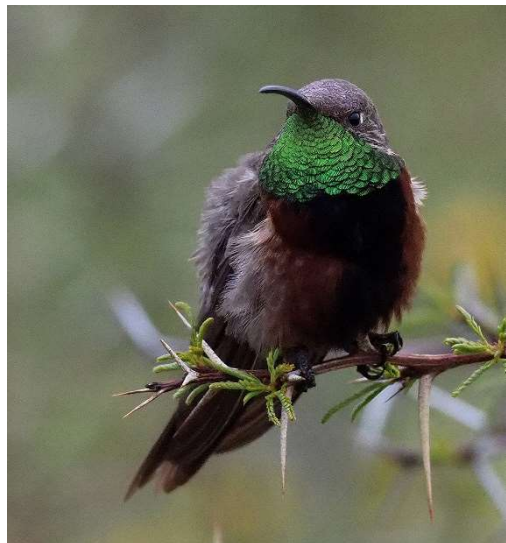
Today we were heading into the high Andes around Abra de lizoite which would be our highest elevation of the trip at 4,550m. The scenery was spectacular and our experience up here was certainly enjoyed by everyone and included some very nice birds. Lesser Rhea's were seen well again and we added **Grey-breasted Seedsnipe**, Straight-billed and Buff-breasted Earthcreepers, Ornate Tinamou, Mountain Caracara, Mountain Parakeet, Andean Hillstar, Andean Flicker, White-winged and Cream-winged Cinclodes, Cordilleran Canastero, Cinereous Ground Tyrant, Black-billed Shrike-Tyrant, Black-fronted and Puna Ground Tyrants, Andean Swallow, Mourning, Plumbeous, Ash-breasted and some nice Red-backed Sierra Finches and both Bright-rumped and Greenish Yellow Finches. The habitat was perfect but despite a good search, we could not find Diademed Sandpiper Plover this time. For the rest of the day, we birded the dry bushes around Yavi, a



pleasant way to end our day. With Aplomado Falcon, Spot-winged Pigeon, Puna Ibis, Black-hooded Sierra Finch, Rusty-vented Canastero, Red-tailed Comet, White-tipped Plantcutter, Yellow-billed Tit-Tyrant, D'Orbigny's Chat Tyrant, Cliff Flycatcher, Brown-backed and Patagonian Mockingbirds, Pampa Finch, Diuca Finch and more looks at the rare Citron-headed Yellow Finches we retired to our lovely Posada.

Day 14- 16th Dec

Our early morning around Yavi provided simply amazing sightings of several stunning male **Wedge-tailed Hillstar**. Then after breakfast, we started driving back towards Jujuy. Near to Abra Pampa, a nice stop at El Huancar offered close looks at Giant and Andean Coots, Puna Teal, Silvery and White-tufted Grebes, Cinnamon Teal, Andean Duck, Puna Ibis, Andean Gull, Mountain Parakeet, Wren-like Rushbird and Many-colored Rush-Tyrant. Later on, at a lower elevation, we stopped for our picnic lunch at Chorillos. Here we got Tufted Tit-Tyrant, **Yellow-billed Tit-Tyrant**, Giant Hummingbird, Sparkling Violetear, White-tipped Plantcutter, White-winged Black Tyrant and few others. Continuing on to the lower Yungas we made another quick stop at Yala where we had Scaly-



headed Parrot and Smoke-coloured Pewee. More unsuccessful attempts to find Tucuman Amazon put us around Almona to finish our long day. But not before seeing our last Rusty-browed Warbling Finch and White-browed Brushfinch. Our final dinner and review of an incredible bird list ended what was undoubtedly a fantastic tour. Many thanks must go to our main guide Mario, and also Eduardo and our excellent driver Carlos.



Day 15- 17th Dec

Today saw our early morning flights from Jujuy to Buenos Aires, and the end of our tour.
